WORKING GROUP ON MAFA

The Working Group on MAFA has held one meeting since ICC ACoruna. This meeting was held on 2nd November, 2005 as a joint meeting with the CODI- Geo Working Group on Fundamental Geospatial Datasets. This meeting was held in Pretoria during the Africa GIS conference and therefore took advantage of those members who attended the Africa GIS 2005 conference. It is worth noting that all the members of CODI-Geo Working Group are also members of WG on MAFA.

During previous meetings it had been agreed that a project be undertaken to understand the Fundamental datasets that are available in individual countries in Africa. This would determine the existing gaps in Fundamental datasets and thereby propose remedies to filling the gaps as well as harmonising these datasets across Africa in a seamless manner.

Project Mapping Africa for Africa

The purpose of the project is to achieve MAFA's aims so as to address the issue of a lack of accurate, reliable and up-to-date fundamental geo-spatial datasets essential for effective and efficient decision making and development planning in Africa.

The joint Working Group meeting held in Addis Ababa in May,2005 concurred on an outline of the project plan which included the need to come up with what may be considered as the requisite Fundametal datasets for Africa. This would be followed by implementation of the yet to be developed Action Plan for each country in Africa as would have been reflected in the status of the availablity of the fundamental datasets in each particular country.

Project Fundamental Geospatial Datasets for Africa

The project results should be able to address:

- 1. What are the Fundamental geo-spatial datasets?
- 2. What datasets are available in Africa?
- 3. How can the missing datasets be provided?
- 4. Should there be data standards?

The Government of the Republic of South Africa through the Chief Directorate of Surveys and Mapping Department kindly offered to meet the expenses for this study by hiring Consultants. The institutions hired are Human Sciences Research Council of South Africa together with Environmental Information System-Africa {EIS-Africa}. These two institutions have been working with other key institutions and individuals from across Africa which are involved in various aspects of geo- information applications, training ,capacity building and research.

These two institutions have been conducting a user needs analysis as to determine what can be considered as a set of fundamental geo-spatial datasets for Africa to encompass local, national, sub-regional and regional levels.



The project had been divided into two tasks as follows:

- 1. Determination of Fundamental Geo-spatial Datasets
- 2. Inventory of available Fundamental Geo-spatial Datasets

The first task is complete and the report was presented to the joint WG meeting in Pretoria.It was decided at the meeting to distribute the report for comment.It is upon receipt of the comments and being attended to, is when the final draft will be submitted to the joint WG for approval.

The second task that involves the inventory of available fundamental geo-spatial datasets is to follow upon end of task 1 and will be undertaken by each individual country. Completion of tasks 1 and 2 will result into preparation of project proposal on" Project Mapping Africa for Africa"that will be submitted to NEPAD Secretariat and African Union to source for funding.

Next Meeting Of the Working Group On MAFA

Due to financial constraints it has not been possible to meet as frequent as we would have wished. We have not had a meeting this year. However, it is proposed that the next meeting be held during the 6th AARSE conference in Cairo in October/November 2006 for those members of the WG on MAFA who will attend the conference.

Capacity Building in Africa-My Views
